

## About the Trail System

There are approximately 5 miles of trails here at the Plainsboro Preserve. They range from our wide lake side White Trail to our forested Yellow Trail. The difficulty of these trails range from easy to moderate, making them a wonderful place to hike for most everyone.

As you walk the trails you will notice a change in the ecosystems. You may be in a dense Beech Forest one moment and in a wide field the next. It is these differences in such close proximity to one another that makes the Plainsboro Preserve such a special place.

The cornerstone of the Preserve is Lake McCormack. In the late 1960's McCormack Sand and Gravel Company began mining on the property. After only a few years the mining operation hit a spring and began to flood. As the mining dwindled, water filled what is now Lake McCormack. The lake is used by many species of waterfowl and wading birds, beavers, turtles, fish, frogs and otters.

Trails are open from early morning to early evening. See posted hours at trail entrance for seasonal hours. If your car is left after posted hours, you will have to call the Plainsboro Police at 609-799-2333 to get out.

**For the enjoyment of the Preserve and the protection of the habitat and wildlife, the following are not permitted:**

- Picking, removing or harming any plants or animals
- Pets and horses
- Fishing and hunting
- Bicycles or motorized vehicles past the parking area
- Swimming and boating
- Picnicking, smoking, and alcoholic beverages
- Agricultural easements are off limits to the public


