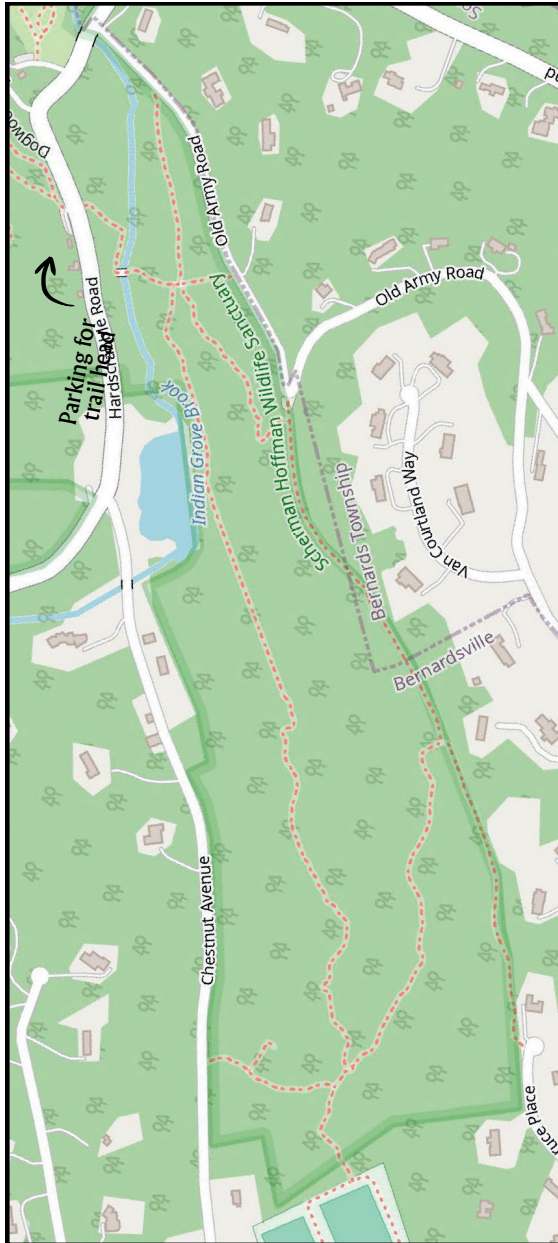


OLD ARMY TRAIL

Access Points: 51 Hardscrabble Road NJA Parking lot or
NJA Chestnut Avenue pull-off lot
Length: 2-mile loop
Difficulty: Moderate; hilly terrain with steep sections,
rocks, and roots
History: Named for the Revolutionary War path cut by
Continental Army soldiers from Jockey Hollow to
Vealtown Tavern (now the Old Library building) in
Bernardsville



The Hoffman Center, located in the driveway loop shown on the map, houses our Nature Store, Observation Deck, program Classrooms, Art Gallery, and Discovery Room. Our Nature Store features new arrivals, bird feeders, nest boxes, and gift items, along with a wide variety of bird-friendly products to suit your needs. We also carry a selection of popular binoculars, spotting scopes, books, and more.

Directions to the sanctuary

From Route 287

- Take exit 30B (Bernardsville) and bear right onto N. Maple Ave.
- Go through the light at Route 202/Morristown Rd. (road becomes Childs Rd.)
- Bear right at the fork onto Hardscrabble Rd.
- Driveway is about 1 mile ahead on the right

From Chester area (Route 24)

- Take Route 24 east through Mendham
- Turn right at the New Jersey Audubon sign onto Tempe Wick Rd.
- Continue 2 miles, then turn right onto Leddell Rd. (across from pond)
- At the stop sign, turn left onto Hardscrabble Rd.
- Driveway is about 1¼ miles ahead on the left

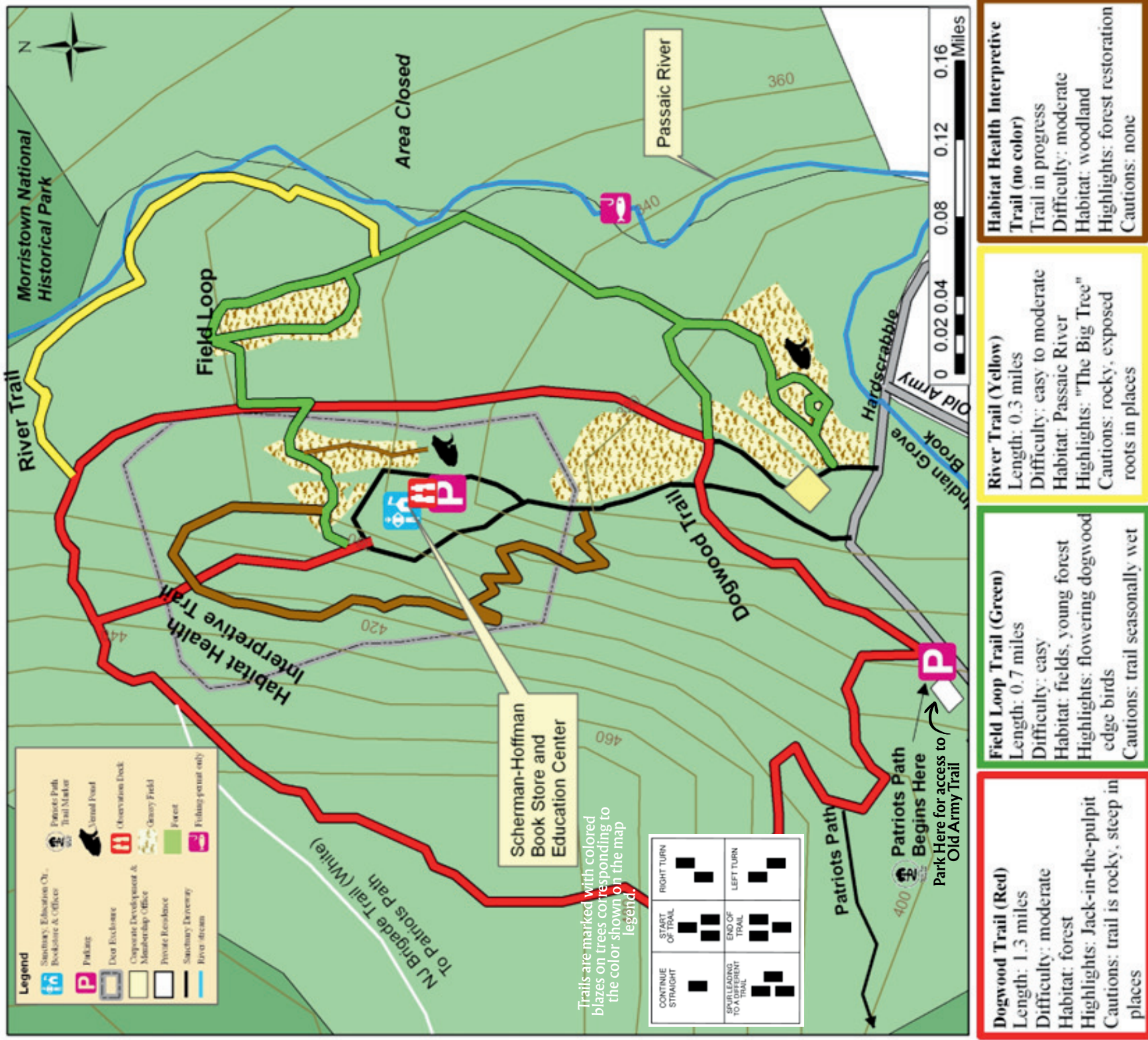
