## Audubon turns to Pinelands for brochure

■ The group is accepting nominations for locations that are deserving of inclusion in its fourth wildlife guide.


The state Audubon Society is looking for public input to find the best spots in the Pinelands to watch birds and other wildlife.

Approved sites will be included on a brochure and Web site directing people to those areas as a way to promote ecotourism, said Lillian Armstrong, the Audubon Society's director of birding and wildlife trails.

"Nature-based tourism remains growing and is an important part of our whole package in the state of New Jersey," Armstrong said.

The society is spearheading a project to map the best public and private wildlife sites in Atlantic, Burlington, Gloucester and Camden counties for its upcoming Pinelands Birding and Wildlife Trail guide.

"Pinelands are certainly a unique habitat," Armstrong said. "It will be about much, much more than the birds. It

will be a lot about snakes and turtles and plants."

The project is funded by the state Department of Transportation through a federal grant.

This is the fourth time Audubon has set out to identify prime wildlife spots and advertise them. Others include the Delaware Bayshore Birding and Wildlife Program, which provides information on sites in Cape May, Cum-

berland and Salem counties; the Hackensack River watershed; as well as sites in the northern tip of the state.

The first three projects resulted in 24 driving routes to more than 200 locations.

For the Pinelands map, officials have received about 25 nominations but are looking for about 100, Armstrong said.

When the nominations are in, they will be assessed based

on their wildlife viewing, accessibility and safety, Armstrong said.

Nominations will be accepted through the end of June, and assessments of the nominated sites will continue into the early fall.

The sites should be listed on brochures and on the Web site by spring 2010, Armstrong said.


time.
